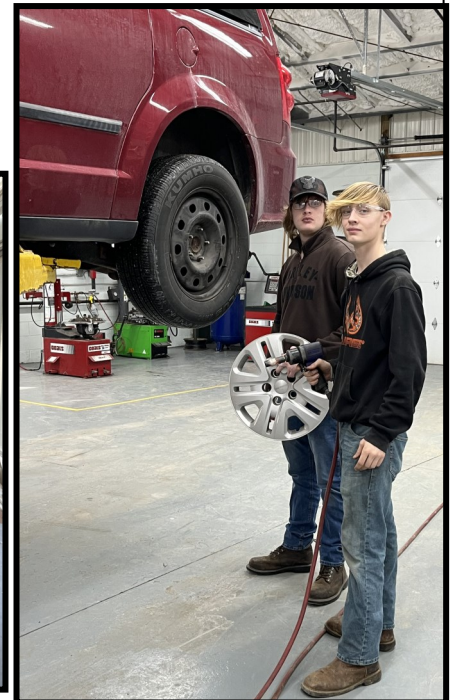

To kickoff the second semester, Building Trades students attended a field trip to Alpena Community College (ACC) where Mr. Kollien started the day off with an introduction to college life and what opportunities ACC offers each of our students. Students were taken on a tour of the college campus by several student

representatives and exposed to the college's multiple trades-related programs including Concrete Technology, Electrical System Technology, Linesman Training facility, Welding, CAD design, Automotive Service Technology, and Underwater ROV programs. Industry instructors discussed the challenges and rewards of careers in each of their specialty fields and the employment opportunities afforded to our students. As the tour came to a close, students were treated to a hearty lunch provided by Alpena Community College and a brief closing ceremony in the auditorium. Once again, it was a great experience for all who attended the day's festivities.

Our latest housing project is nearing completion and is anticipated to close by July 2023. Students are working steadily to bring the project to a close and are currently applying the finishing touches to the kitchen cabinets, finish flooring, painting, decking, interior doors and trim. We will wrap-up the season by installing the finish decking and pouring the homes approach and sidewalks. Our next housing project is underway with the construction of the foundation scheduled to be complete prior to the students' return in the fall.

Three of this year's students are planning to attend Alpena Community College pursuing careers in concrete technology and linesman programs, four will enter into employment with commercial and residential construction firms, and one graduate has committed to the United States Army.

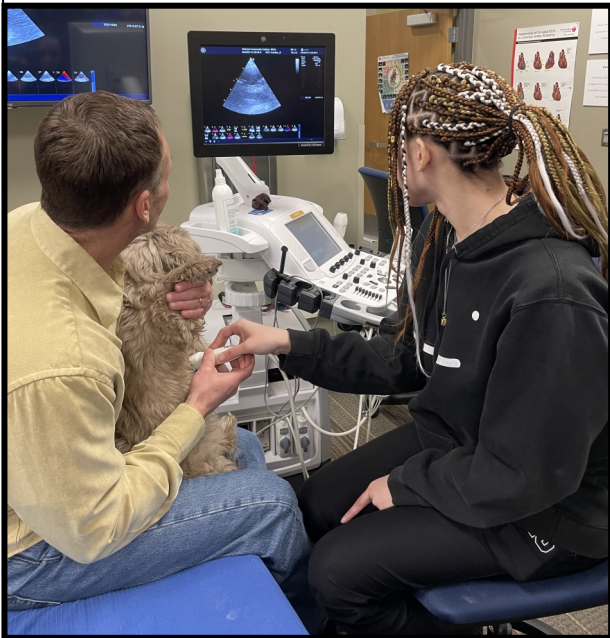

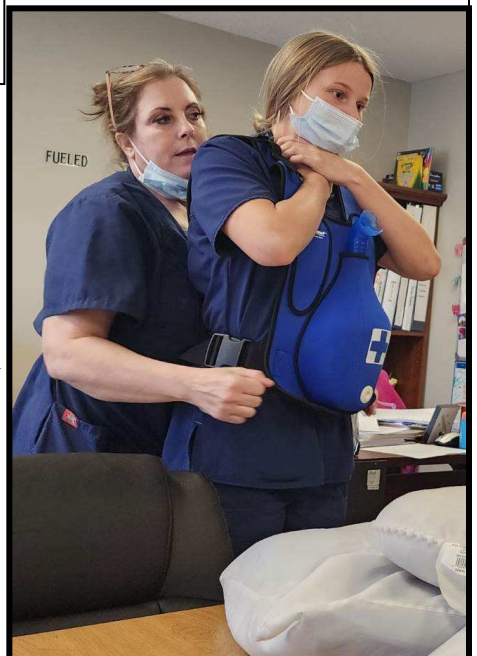

Mrs. Frank - Gerstacker Trip to Finland and Germany

This spring Mrs. Kelly Frank, Teacher Prep Academy Instructor, traveled to Finland and Germany with Saginaw Valley State University’s Gerstacker Fellowship Cohort #16 to explore and learn about those nations’ schools and universities. For two days she was led by the University of Helsinki’s College of Education where she toured several schools and met with students, teachers, and principals. She recalls, “I was amazed at the family-feel of each school. Youngsters walk or ride bikes to school; there are no buses. I saw Middle Schoolers working with blacksmith fire and tools. I really enjoyed eating the homemade lunches at the school.” Next she traveled to several cities throughout Germany where she learned about the levels and tracking systems of that education system. Mrs. Frank explained, “It was interesting to see 9th grade students in an Agricultural College learning to become butchers and farm mechanics. I also visited a FosBos school where students can study for a full year for the university entrance exam. My favorite elementary school was nature-based. Each classroom had its own garden area of a 1 acre woods. There were no fences to contain the school yard, but rather a simple pathway surrounding the perimeter. It was peaceful. Once students there bring in their hay, they’re encouraged to take it home to their pets!” A highlight of the trip was a visit to U.S. Army Base Katterbach to learn about the Department of Defense Educational Activity.

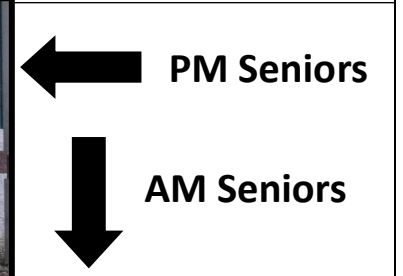
